

Child Abuse Prevention & Reporting and Adult Sexual Misconduct

Mandatory Training for PPS Volunteers & Informational Training for Parents/ Guardians

PPS is Committed to the Safety of Students

- X School employees are required to take annual child abuse prevention training (ORS 339.400).
- X As a volunteer, you should report suspected incidents of child abuse to the school principal .
- X Oregon Child Abuse Reporting Law (ORS 419B.005 to 419B.05D):
 - x All adults have the responsibility to report suspected child abuse.
 - X All school district employees are mandatory reporters, and must report if they suspect child abuse or neglect.

If a student reports abuse to you while you are volunteering at PPS

- X Always take it seriously.
- X Your responsibility is to report it to the school principal so that further evaluations can occur.
- X Do not ask a child to show you their injuries.
- X If a child says that they are hurt and refers to a I.9 C2

Types of Child Abuse

- X Physical Abuse
- X Child Sexual Abuse
- **X** Neglect
- × Emotional Abuse/Mental Injury× Threat of Harm

Physical Abuse

X Physical abuse is the intended, non-accidental physical injury or cruelty to a child.

X Physical abuse can result in any of the following:

XSkin injuries (bruises, swelling, scrapes, welts, burns)

- ×Fractures or sprains
- ×Internal injuries
- XHead injuries
- x Death

Child Sexual Abuse


X Child sexual abuse occurs when an adult (or an older child) uses or tries to use, a child for sexual gratification.



Neglect

- X Neglect is the most common type of abuse.
- X Children are considered neglected whenever their basic needs are not met.
- X Neglect is the chronic or repeated failure to provide children with: food, clothing, shelter, medical care, attention to physical hygiene, social and educational opportunities and adequate supervision.
- X A child must never be left in a position of authority or in situations that they cannot handle, depending on the child' 1 t9icies and








PPS Employees are Mandatory Reporters

- X Any person may report incidents or suspected child abuse or neglect.
- X School personnel, day-care providers, social workers, health care workers, and law enforcement officers are all designated as mandatory reporters in Oregon.
- X Oregon state law requires mandatory reporters to notify the Department of Human Services (DHS) or a local law enforcement agency of incidents or suspected child abuse.

If you See Something, Say Something

- × A volunteer who observes signs, or becomes aware of potential child abuse should immediately report it to the school principal .
- X Under no circumstances should anyone contact a student's parent/guardian about a child abuse report.
- X Volunteers must keep all information about students strictly confidential.

Definition of Adult Sexual Misconduct

- X Any sexual activity (physical or not) directed to a student with the purpose of developing a romantic or sexual relationship.*
- X Also, sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal or physical harassment of a sexual nature. Harassment does not have to be of a sexual nature, however, and can include offensive remarks about a person's sex/gender/orientation. **

Perpetrators of Adult Sexual Misconduct Work Diligently to Hide it By:

XAppearing above reproach

XDeveloping close ties to family and school

XWorking to develop loyalty in the student

×Claiming to be acting out of concern

XGoing on the attack



Inappropriate Behavior

- X Inappropriate touching- patting butt, backrubs, front hugs
- x Sexual comments about students
- × Showing porn or risqué content to students
- X Poor boundaries/oversharing
- X Being alone in a locked room
- × Private internet contact or "sexting"
- X Hanging out with students off school grounds in non-school based activities

So what is okay with students? Appropriate Behavior May Include:

- X Positive reinforcement
- X Appropriate humor
- X Non-personal compliments
- × Overt and public interactions
- X Legitimate non-sexual touching: side hugs, or comforting an injured student. However, children have a right to not be touched at all, if they prefer. Respect their boundaries.
